Mathematics (Beauty)	One course. A score of 4 or 5 on the Calculus AB or BC AP exam fulfills this requirement.		
Natural Science	One lab course or 2 non-lab courses. If two non-lab courses are taken, an elective will be used to fulfill the second course.		
Non-Native Language	1-2 courses at placement level; competency at the intermediate level in an Asian language is required for the major. <b>Please Note:</b> only one course is required if placed at the 301 level (or higher). If placed lower than 301, two courses are required.	1.	2.

Writing	ENG 101 Craft of Language; may also be satisfied by earning a 4 or a 5 on the English Literature or Language AP test.

<p style="text-align: center;"><b><u>Asian Studies Electives and Concentration (from 2011-12 SJU Catalog)</u></b></p> <p>Students must complete a minimum of seven elective courses, reflective of their geographical area of concentration and exclusive of language courses at or below the intermediate level.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Geographic concentration: students must complete a geographical focus, with four elective classes in one of two geographical concentrations: East Asia or South Asia. This requirement may also be satisfied by at least one semester of study abroad in the area of concentration.</li> <li>• To insure interdisciplinary breadth, elective courses must be selected from at least four different departments. In addition, electives must be distributed to ensure breadth of study, with at least one course taken from each of three categories:             <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ Art (e.g., Asian Cinemas), Literature (e.g. Literature of South Asia) and Language (e.g., Japanese Film and Culture)</li> <li>○ Philosophy and Theology and Religious Studies (e.g., Mahayana Buddhism)</li> <li>○ Social Sciences (e.g., Asian Economies; Japanese Politics) and Business</li> </ul> </li> </ul> <p>To insure geographical breadth at least two elective courses must be taken outside the student's concentration (whether East Asia or South Asia).</p>

<p><b><u>Changes to Faith &amp; Reason, Overlay Requirements</u></b></p> <p><b><i>Note for the Class of 2014:</i></b> Of the four GEP requirements—Faith Reason and the three overlay requirements—students in the Class of 2014 need to satisfy two of the four requirements. Students in the Class of 2014 need to complete (1) a Faith and Reason course and one overlay requirement OR (2) two overlay requirements.</p> <p><b><i>Note for the Class of 2015:</i></b> Of the four GEP requirements—Faith Reason and the three overlay requirements—students in the Class of 2015 need to satisfy three of the four. Students in the Class of 2015 would have to complete (1) a Faith and Reason course and two overlay requirements OR (2) all three overlay requirements.</p> <p><b><i>Students in the Class of 2016 are required to fulfill Faith &amp; Reason and all three overlay requirements</i></b></p>
