### Changes to Faith & Reason, Overlay Requirements

#### **Note for the Class of 2014:**

Of the four GEP requirements—Faith & Reason and the three overlay requirements—students in the Class of 2014 need to satisfy two of the four requirements. Students in the Class of 2014 need to complete (1) a Faith and Reason course and one overlay requirement OR (2) two overlay requirements.

#### **Note for the Class of 2015:**

Of the four GEP requirements—Faith & Reason and the three overlay requirements—students in the Class of 2015 need to satisfy three of the four. Students in the Class of 2015 would have to complete (1) a Faith and Reason course and two overlay requirements OR (2) all three overlay requirements.

*Students in the Class of 2016 are required to complete Faith & Reason and all three overlays*
