Changes to Faith & Reason, Overlay Requirements

Note for the Class of 2014: Of the four GEP requirements—Faith Reason and the three overlay requirements—students in the Class of 2014 need to satisfy two of the four requirements. Students in the Class of 2014 need to complete (1) a Faith and Reason course and one overlay requirement OR (2) two overlay requirements.

Note for the Class of 2015: Of the four GEP requirements—Faith Reason and the three overlay requirements—students in the Class of 2015 need to satisfy three of the four. Students in the Class of 2015 would have to complete (1) a Faith and Reason course and two overlay requirements OR (2) all three overlay requirements.

Note for the Class of 2016: Students must complete (1) Faith & Reason and (2) two of three overlay requirements.

 - IHS331 Statistics and Research Methodology fulfills this overlay requirement (as of Spring 2012)

Overlays may be fulfilled by a GEP variable course, major course, minor course, or free elective that is certified to meet the requirement. However, the Religious Difference course requirement cannot be used to fulfill the Diversity, Non-Western, or Globalization overlay.
